What is a Visual Story?

A visual story is a tool to help audience members familiarize themselves with a venue and/or with a show. It allows audience members to know in advance what to expect from a theatrical experience, so that they can prepare themselves accordingly. Visual stories were created as an aid for autistic people and people with learning disabilities, but they can be used to help anyone prepare for their visit to the theatre.

This guide might be particularly useful if it is your first time going to see a play, or your first time visiting this theatre.

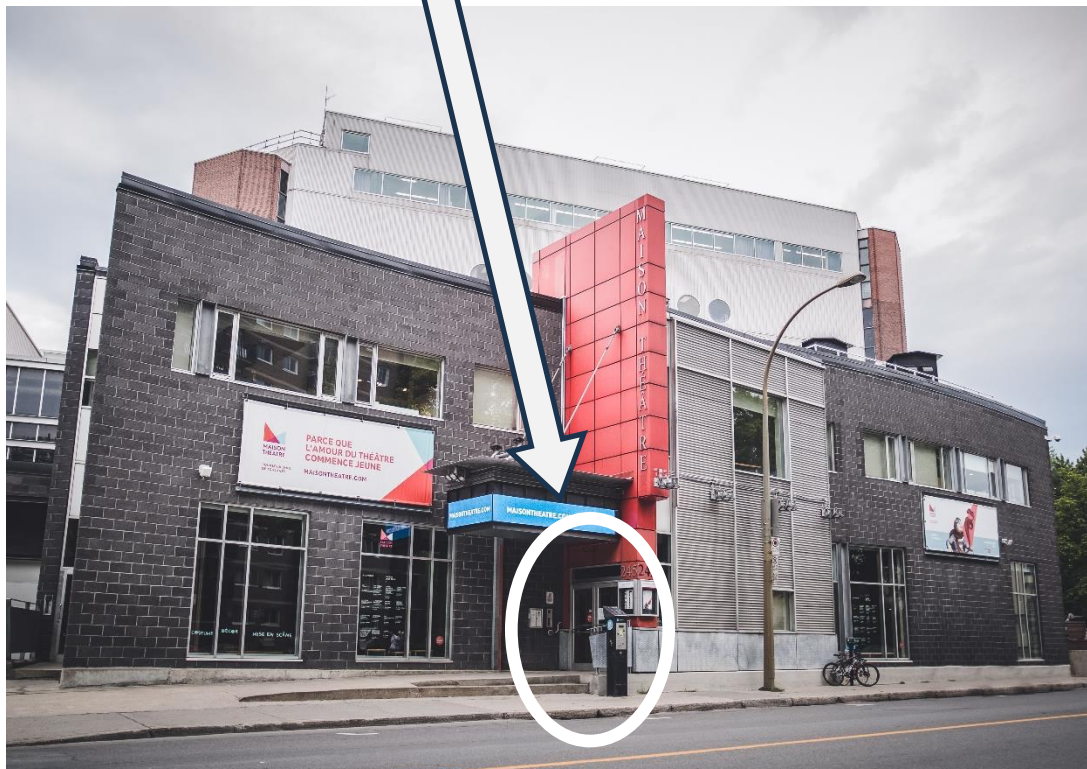

The main entrance is here:

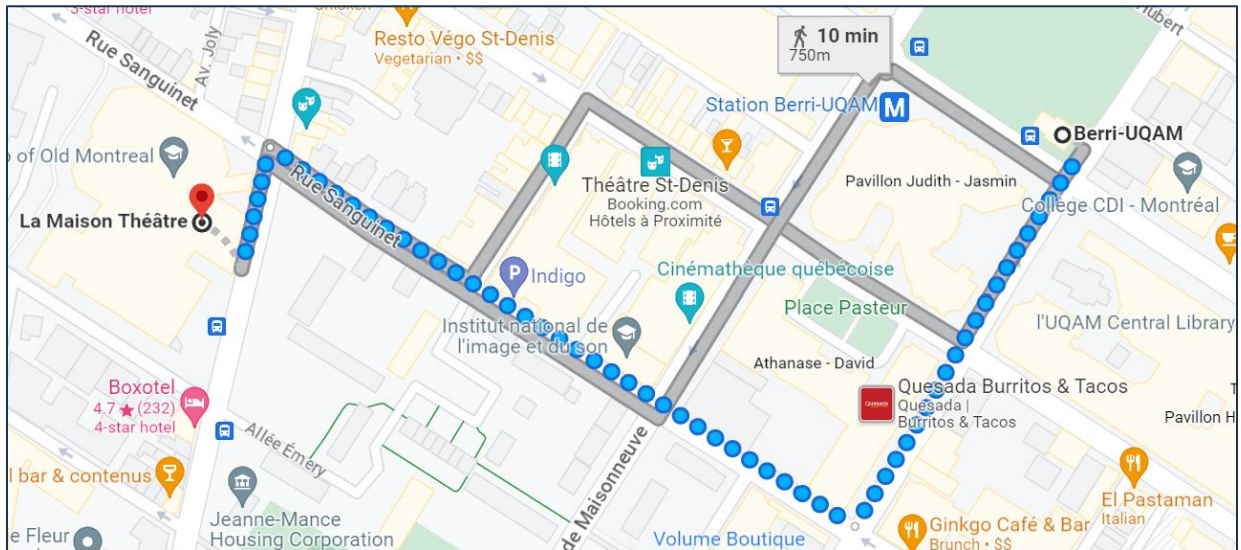

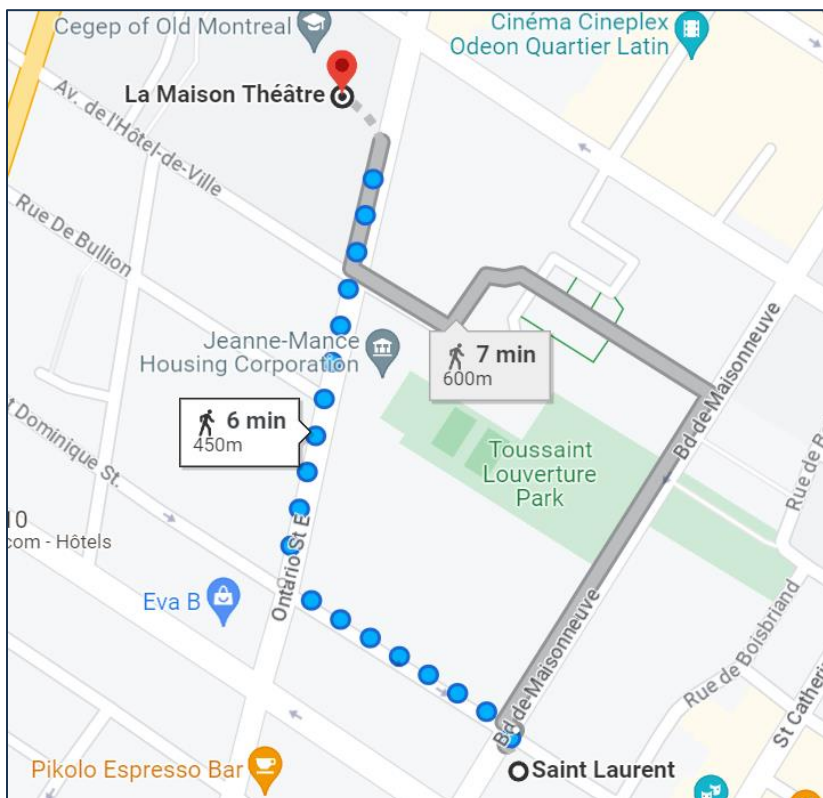
By public transit

From Berri-UQAM:



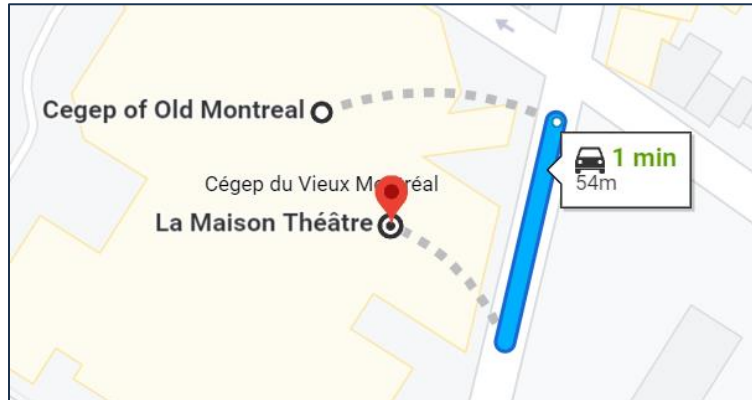
From Saint-Laurent:

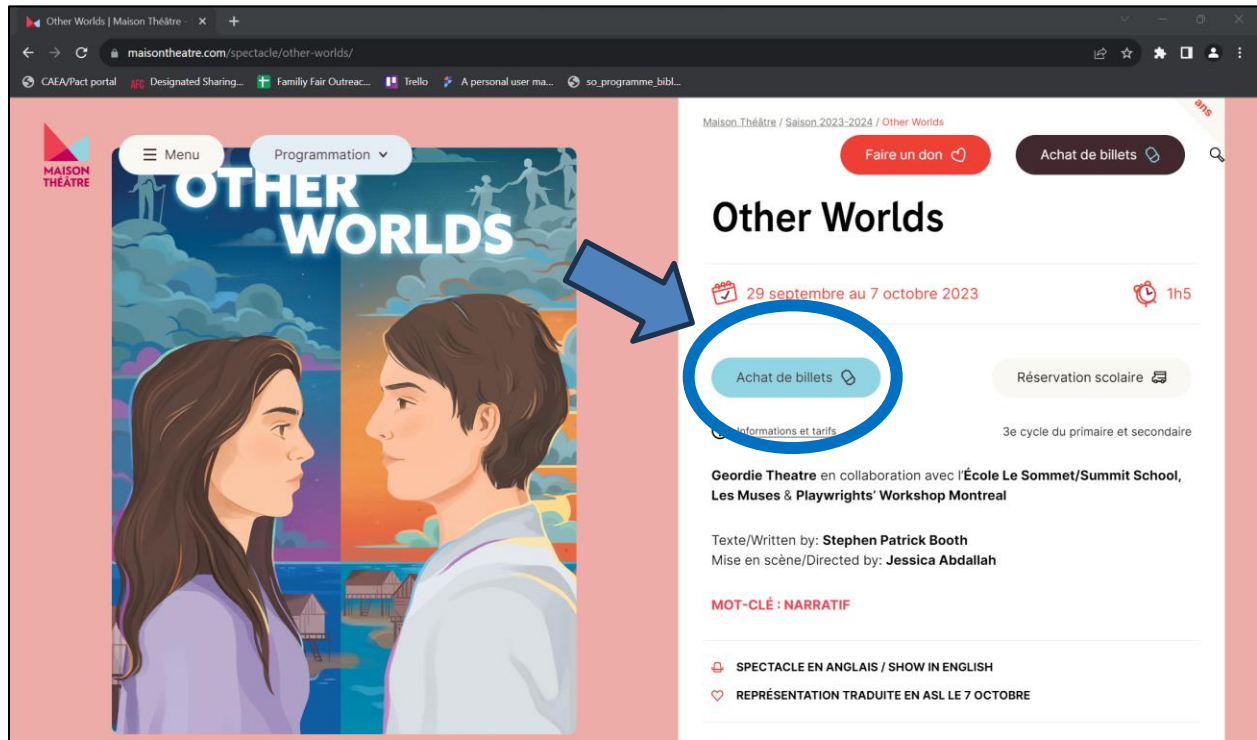

TICKETS



This will take you to La Maison Théâtre’s website. Click on “Achat de billets”, then follow the steps to choose a date and time, choose your seats, and pay for your tickets.



Electronic tickets look like this:



You can show it to the staff on your phone or print it and show them the paper.

You can also buy tickets in person at the theatre's box office:

1. Go in through the main entrance.
2. Turn left and go through another door.
3. Turn right.
4. The box office counter will be on your right.

The building

Elevator

The entrances to the theatre are in the basement. If you have reduced mobility, a staff member will give you access to the elevator.

Washrooms

There are gendered washrooms in the hallway past the entrances to the theatre.

There is also one gender-neutral, wheelchair accessible washroom on the ground floor. From the main entrance:

1. Turn left and go through the door
2. Turn left again and go through another door
3. The washroom will be to your right, in the back corner of the room



Quiet Space, Dynamic Space and Reading Corner

The theatre has a quiet space, a dynamic space and a reading corner. You are welcome to use them before, during and after the show.

Quiet Space: The quiet space is down the stairs and to your right. You can go there if you need a calm place to take a break. It has noise-cancelling headphones, weighted plush toys, and comfortable chairs and cushions.



Dynamic Space: The dynamic space is at the top of the stairs, on the side of the theatre where the seats have odd numbers. You can go there if you want to move around and spend your energy. You can walk up and down the hallway, keep your balance on the little benches, and try the wobble seats.



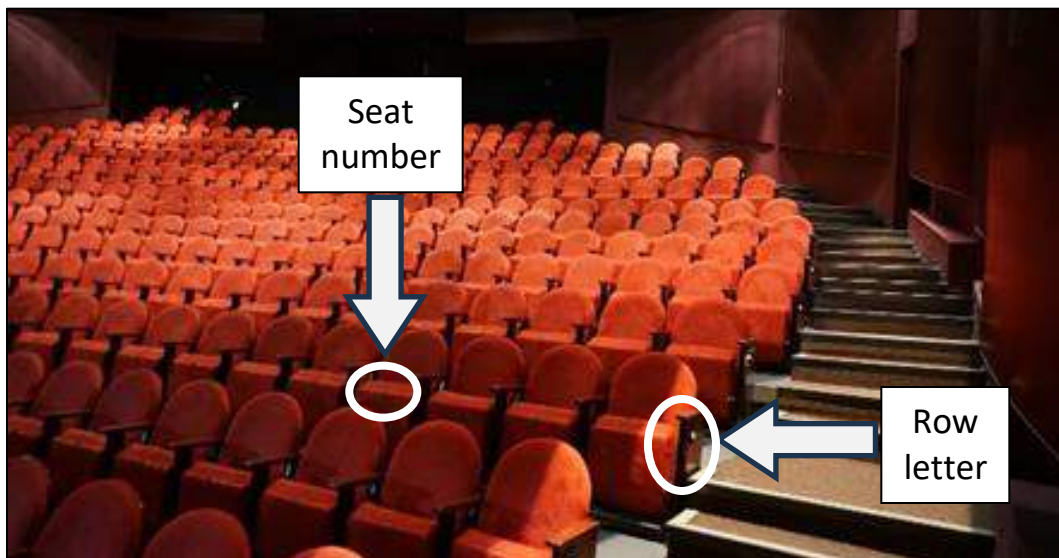
Reading Corner: The reading corner is in the hallway between the two washrooms. You can go there to read books and relax.

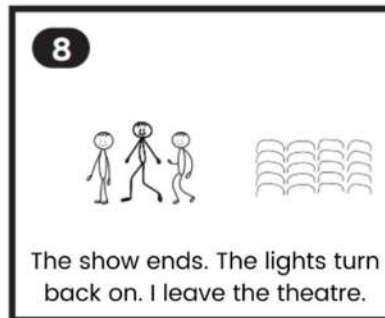
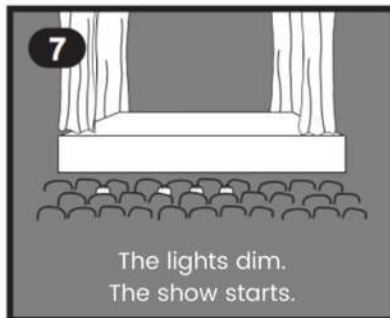
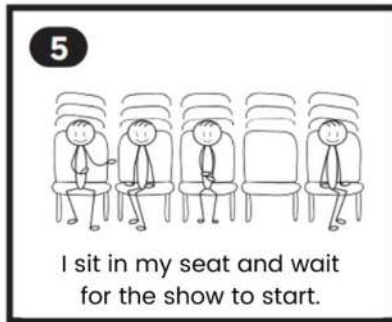
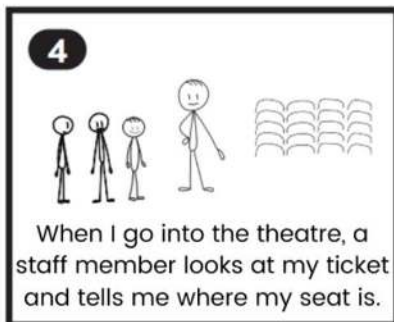
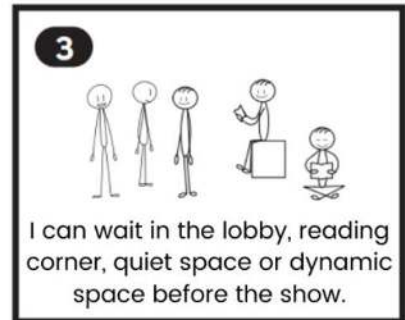
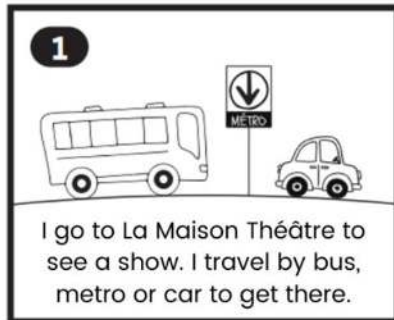
The theatre staff will have weighted blankets, weighted plushies, noise-cancelling headphones, and fidget toys. If you want to use any of them, you can ask a staff member before or during the show.

To find your seat, look for the row that has the same letter as your ticket, then look for the seat that has the same number as your ticket.



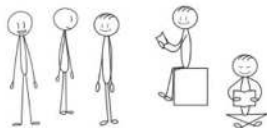
You can go to the washroom, quiet space, dynamic space and reading corner during the show if you need to, and you can come back into the theatre at any time.

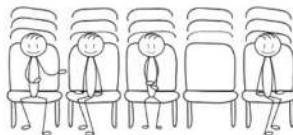
